## World language teachers:

- Share their knowledge and passion for languages and culture;
- Prepare students to compete in a global economy;
- Help students gain a greater perspective of the U.S. and the world; and
- Expand students' knowledge about both the target language and their heritage languages.

## Where is financial aid available?

- Academic Competitiveness Grants for eligible first-year and second-year college students.
- National SMART Grants for eligible third- and fourth-year students.
- Federal Perkins Loans for each year of undergraduate study.
- Scholarships from universities and organizations.

## Are there jobs?

Ohio continues to experience a shortage of qualified world language teachers. As experienced teachers reach retirement, the number of open positions will only increase.

## What do I need to teach in Ohio?

- Undergraduate major in a language.
- Study in other countries to build advanced language proficiency.
- Degree and internship requirements for securing an Ohio teaching license.
- Licensure through one of Ohio's teacher preparation programs or the Alternative Resident Educational Licensure Pathway.
- Passing score on required Ohio tests through above licensure programs.
- World experience such as the Peace Corps ([www.peacecorps.gov](http://www.peacecorps.gov)) or other nonprofit organization in order to gain in-country experience, hone language skills and develop intercultural competence.

## What benefits are there in teaching?

- Work benefits may include health insurance, retirement programs and merit-based salary increases.
- “On-the-job” opportunities for professional growth.
- Development of sought-after skills such as clear communication, strong interpersonal skills and language proficiency.
- Opportunities for summer travel/work abroad during academic recess;
- Invitations to host foreign dignitaries, sports figures and academics visiting local communities.
- Involvement in community activities related to other cultures, such as interpreting and translating for the local media or assisting immigrants with housing, health and legal issues.
- The sense of satisfaction that teaching languages to students increases U.S. economic, security, political and social capabilities worldwide.
