Building Blocks of Progress Resource

The Bill of Rights Institute, in partnership with the Hoover Institution, recently released a new economics resource called <u>"Building Blocks of Progress"</u>. This resource encourages students to consider individuals' daily economic choices. The resource covers the role of individuals, government, and economic principles in

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creating a free society. The resource pairs each lesson with multiple videos developed by the Hoover Institution to create a rich, blended learning experience for students.

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New Holocaust & Humanity Resource: Breaking the Myth: How Jews Resisted During the Holocaust On April 19, 1943, the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising began. It was the largest armed Jewish resistance during WWII. In addition to the uprising, many other forms of resistance took place. Commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising in your classroom with <u>a new curricular resource</u> from the <u>Nancy & David Wolf Holocaust & Humanity Center</u>. Debunking the myth that Jews did not resist, the lesson asks students to identify and examine various types of resistance during the Holocaust through the testimony of local Holocaust survivors. In addition, a letter from Warsaw ghetto resistance fighter Mordechai Anielewicz challenges students to consider the tenacity of the human spirit and the power of historical Jewish resistance to inspire action today.

New NCSS E-Book: Using Inquiry to Prepare Students for College, Career and Civic Life National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) announced a new e-book produced with funding from the

Library of Congress' Teaching with Primary Sources Grant, <u>Using Inquiry to Prepare Students for College,</u> <u>Career, and Civic Life: Elementary Grades</u>. NCSS has designed this resource and its future companion set of online methods texts to support educators constructing inquiry learning through primary source documents in social studies education.
