## OVERALL RESULTS

- In 2022, the average score of fourth-grade students in Ohio was 238. This was higher than the average score of 235 for students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Ohio in 2022 (238) was lower than their average score in 2019 (241) and was higher than their average score in 2000 (230).
- The percentage of students in Ohio who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 40 percent in 2022. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2019 ( 41 percent) and was greater than that in 2000 ( 25 percent).
- The percentage of students in Ohio who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 76 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 ( 82 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2000 ( 73 percent).

## SCORE GAPS FOR STUDENT GROUPS

- In 2022, Black students had an average score that was 37 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2000 (29 points).
- In 2022, Hispanic students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2000, because reporting standards were not met
- In 2022, male students in Ohio had an average score that was higher than that for female students by 6 points.
- In 2022, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2000 (22 points).
