

**The Case for Martin:**  
**An Alternative Pathway to Graduation Sample**

The following forms contain a fictional scenario developed to explain the alternative pathway to graduation mandated by ORC §3313.615. A number in the top-right corner indicates each new section used in this sample. Listed below are the titles of each form and their corresponding number.

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SAMPLE

## Alternative Pathway to Graduation: The Case for Martin

Martin is a senior at Fictional Forest High School with an overall 3.1 GPA. He has passed all of his Ohio Graduation Tests (OGTs) except mathematics. This June he intends to graduate and enroll at a local community college to study business management. The school receives the results for Martin's fifth attempt on the math OGT in March, 2007. Martin failed the OGT, with a scaled score of 392, which is within 10 scaled score points of the 400 cut level for proficiency. His district does not offer summer OGT intervention.

His math grades are as follows (see GPA calculation chart in section 2):

Martin has behaved generally well in school, with his only disciplinary action being a two day suspension in the 10<sup>th</sup> grade for a minor fight. He has never been expelled. His attendance record is as follows:

***Does Martin qualify to graduate under the alternative pathway?***

First, a guidance counselor or another designated employee should check basic information regarding Martin to determine if he is eligible. The guidance counselor prints the alternative pathway to graduation packet which will be posted on the Ohio Department of Education website and goes through the “Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet for Alternative Pathway to Graduation,” (part 3 of this document). These questions work through all of the state requirements for the alternative pathway.

**OGT Scores:**

**(see Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, items A-D)**

The guidance counselor looks at Martin’s previous OGT scores and verifies that Martin passed four OGTs and failed the math OGT by 10 scaled score points or less. Martin’s highest OGT math scaled score was in Autumn 2005. The guidance counselor records the: subject, highest score and date of administration of the failed test on the worksheet.

**Attendance:**

**(see Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, item E)**

A check of attendance records shows that Martin has over a 97% attendance rate each of the last four years.

**Expulsion:**

**(see Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, item F)**

Martin has not been expelled in the last four years, so he is eligible to graduate under this provision.

**Grade Point Average (GPA)**

**(see GPA Calculation Chart, part 2 and  
Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, items G-H)**

The guidance counselor calculated Martin’s unweighted GPA using the “GPA Calculation Chart for Alternative Pathway to Graduation” (labeled “3” in the top-right corner), which will be available on the ODE website. Martin’s grades in mathematics classes lead to an unweighted average of 2.76. The guidance counselor transfers the GPA from the GPA calculation chart to the worksheet in the subject area blank.

**Curriculum:**

**(see Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, item I)**

Martin’s course record shows that he has met the state curriculum for graduation.

**Intervention Programs:**

**(see Guidance Counselor’s Worksheet, item J)**

Fictional Forest High School does not offer OGT intervention programs outside of the school day or year and Martin did not attend one in another district or from a private source, so the guidance counselor skips Question 6.

**Letters of Recommendation:**  
**(see *Teacher Recommendation Form*, part 4 and**  
***Guidance Counselor's Worksheet*, item K)**

At this point, Martin has passed all requirements to be eligible to pursue an alternative pathway to graduation. The guidance counselor informs Martin and invites him to come in for an appointment. Martin visits the guidance counselor two days later and hears about the alternative pathway to graduation. Martin agrees that he wants to pursue it and the guidance counselor gives him three "Teacher Recommendation for Alternative Pathway to Graduation" forms (see part 4 of this document), which will be available on the Ohio Department of Education website. The guidance counselor informs Martin of the locally determined deadline to get his math teachers to sign them.

Martin approaches his teachers from Algebra I, Geometry and Algebra II to get their signatures. All three sign the form. His Geometry teacher leaves comments on the form stating that Martin had trouble initially in the course, but made progress in the second semester. The teachers return the forms to Martin's guidance counselor, who records that they are completed.

**Verification and Approval:**  
**(see *Guidance Counselor's Worksheet*, items L-O)**

The guidance counselor completes the worksheet and attaches the GPA chart and teachers' recommendations. The counselor then signs the worksheet and forwards it to the principal. Martin's principal reads the forms and worksheet and signs the worksheet recommending graduation. Finally, the district superintendent signs the worksheet, completing it. The packet is then added to Martin's permanent record allowing him to graduate.

## GPA Calculation Chart for Alternative Pathway to Graduation

The purpose of this chart is to standardize GPA's statewide for consideration as part of the alternative pathway to graduation. Points are assigned to grades along a 4 point scale, going from 0 to 4. A full-letter grade change is equal to one point. Pluses and minuses raise or lower a grade point by three-tenths of a point. See the chart "Letter Grade to Grade Point Conversion" below for the full scale. Grades are not weighted by type of course taken.

Only those courses within the subject area of the failed test should be considered. Courses are defined as being within the subject according to locally adopted courses of study. Additionally, any courses taken in the last four years in the subject should be included, unless they were retaken and the grade was replaced. In that case, the grade of record should count.

## Teacher Recommendation for Alternative Pathway to Graduation

### **Purpose**

According to ORC §3313.615, students who pass four of five Ohio Graduation Tests and meet other requirements are eligible to graduate. These requirements consider attendance rate, history of expulsion, GPA in subject area, courses taken, attendance and completion of available intervention programs and the recommendation for graduation of teachers and the principal within the subject area.

For teachers who have left the school, another teacher in the department with substantial knowledge of the student's work may substitute.

I hereby recommend **Martin Scott** for graduation based upon performance in subject area coursework.
