# Why I.T.?

Many IT jobs are in demand and growing at above-average rates. Some roles—including software developer, web developer and information security engineer—are expected to grow at rates of up to 33% from 2020 to 2030 according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

## **IT Courses Offered:**

- Information Technology Fundamentals
  - Students will learn safety, security, and ethical issues in computing and social networking. Students will also learn about input/output systems, computer hardware and operating systems, and office applications.
- Programming
  - New course for 2023-24
  - Students will learn the basics of building simple interactive applications, the basic units of logic, and problem solving. They will gain experience in using commercial applications and open

source languages programs, and applications.
