Projected Growth of Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio (2031)

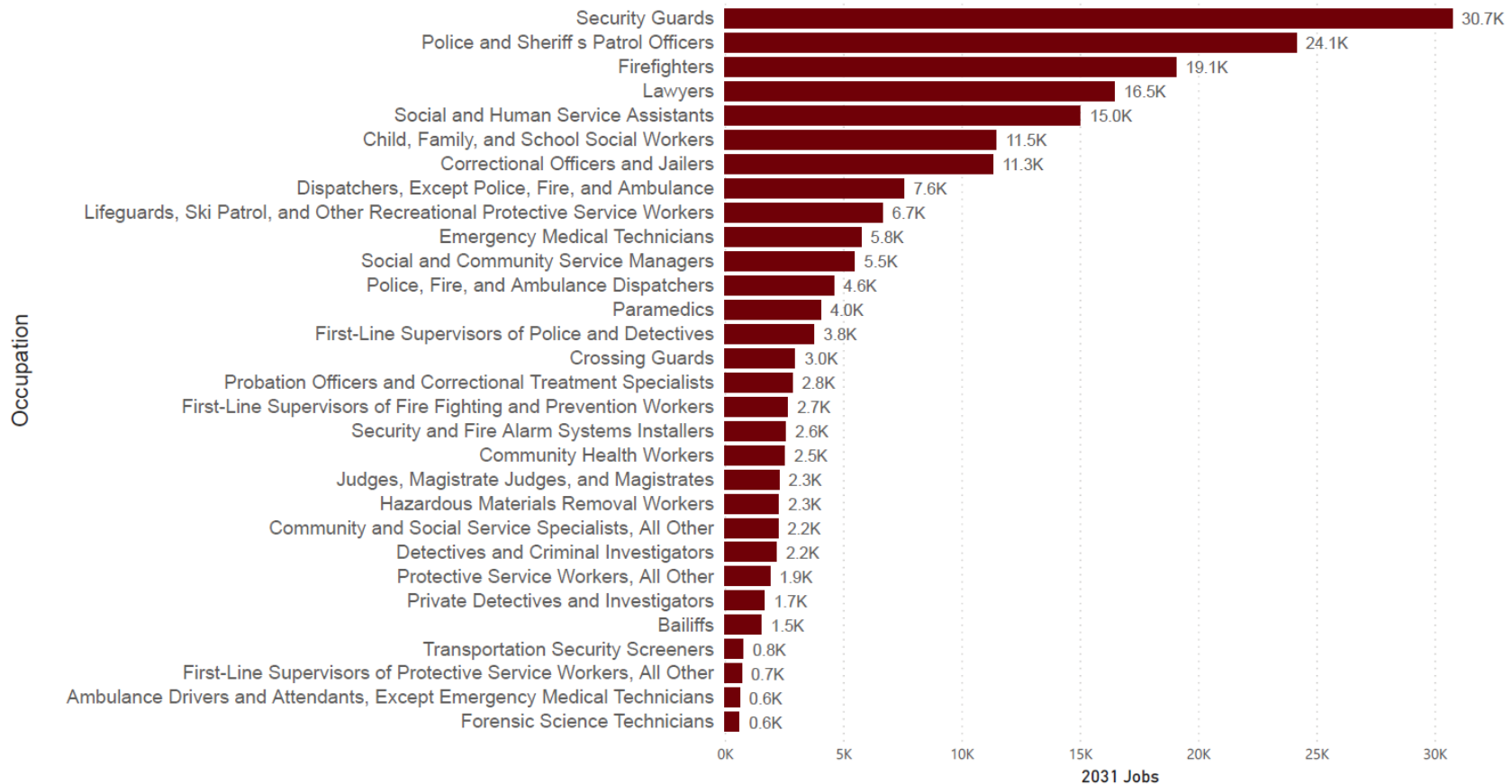


Figure 1 shows the highest in-demand occupations projected for 2031 in the Law and Public Safety career field, with Security Guards topping the list with almost 31,000 jobs in Ohio in 2031.

Projected Growth of Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio (2021-2031)

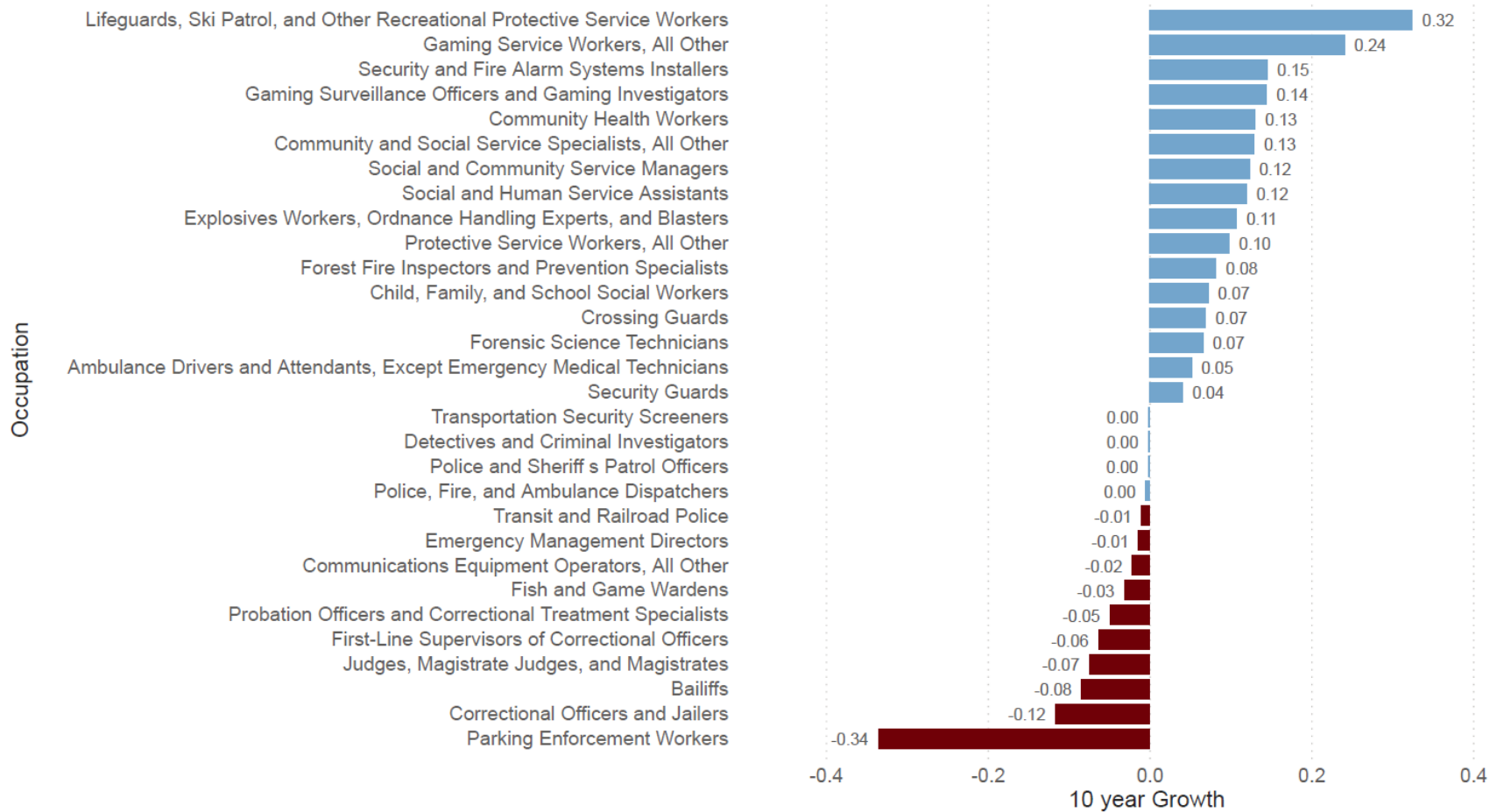


Figure 2 demonstrates the projected growth over the next ten years as a percentage. The blue represents positive growth, with the highest projected growth of 32.5% in Lifeguards, Ski Patrol and Other Recreational Protective Service Workers. The red represents negative growth or a decrease in the number of jobs, with the greatest expected decrease in Parking Enforcement Workers.

Top Companies for Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio

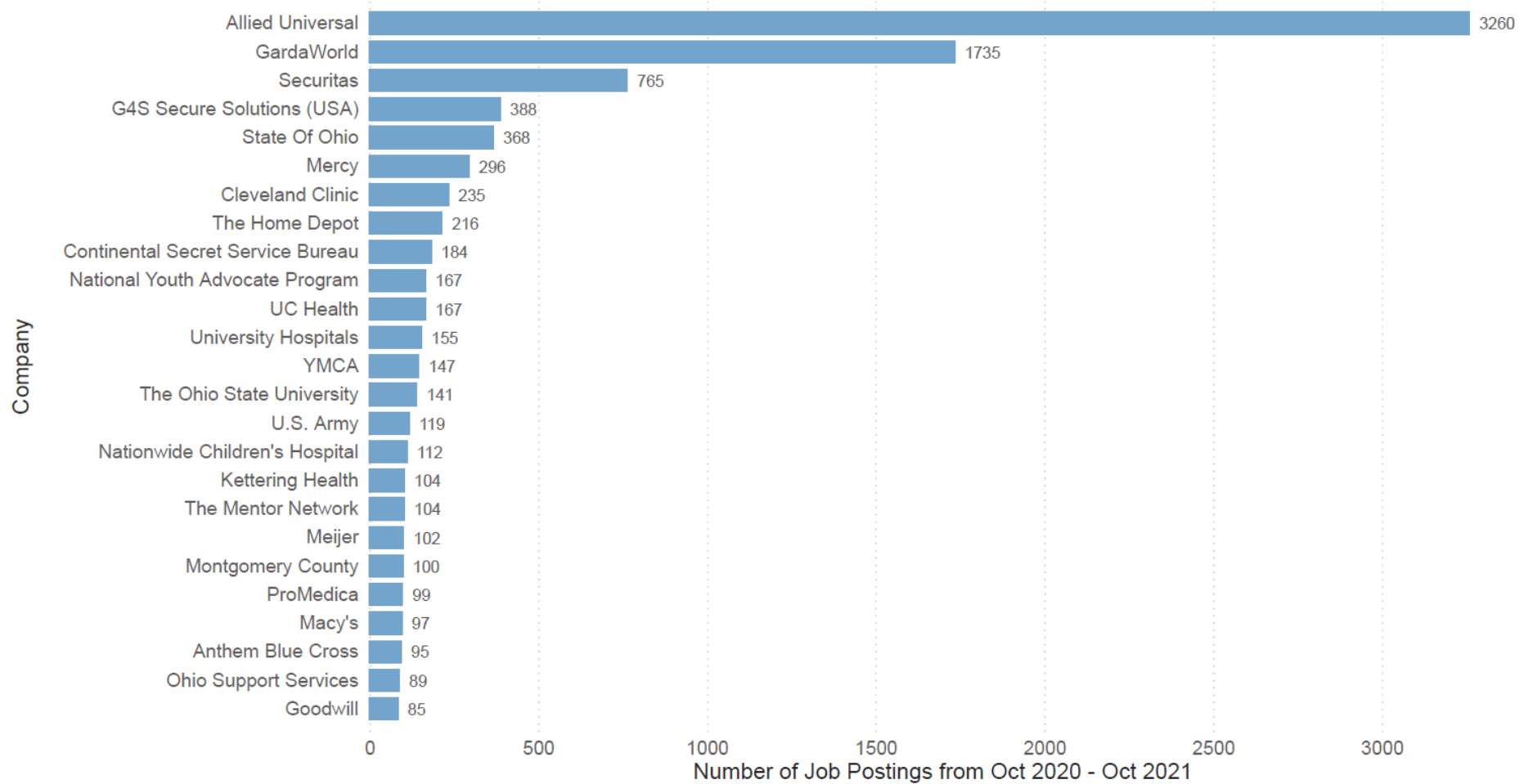


Figure 3 shows the top companies hiring in the Law and Public Safety career field over a one-year period (October 2020-October 2021). There was a total of 30,709 law and public safety job postings during this time period, with the highest number from Allied Universal at 3,260.

Demand and Supply of Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio

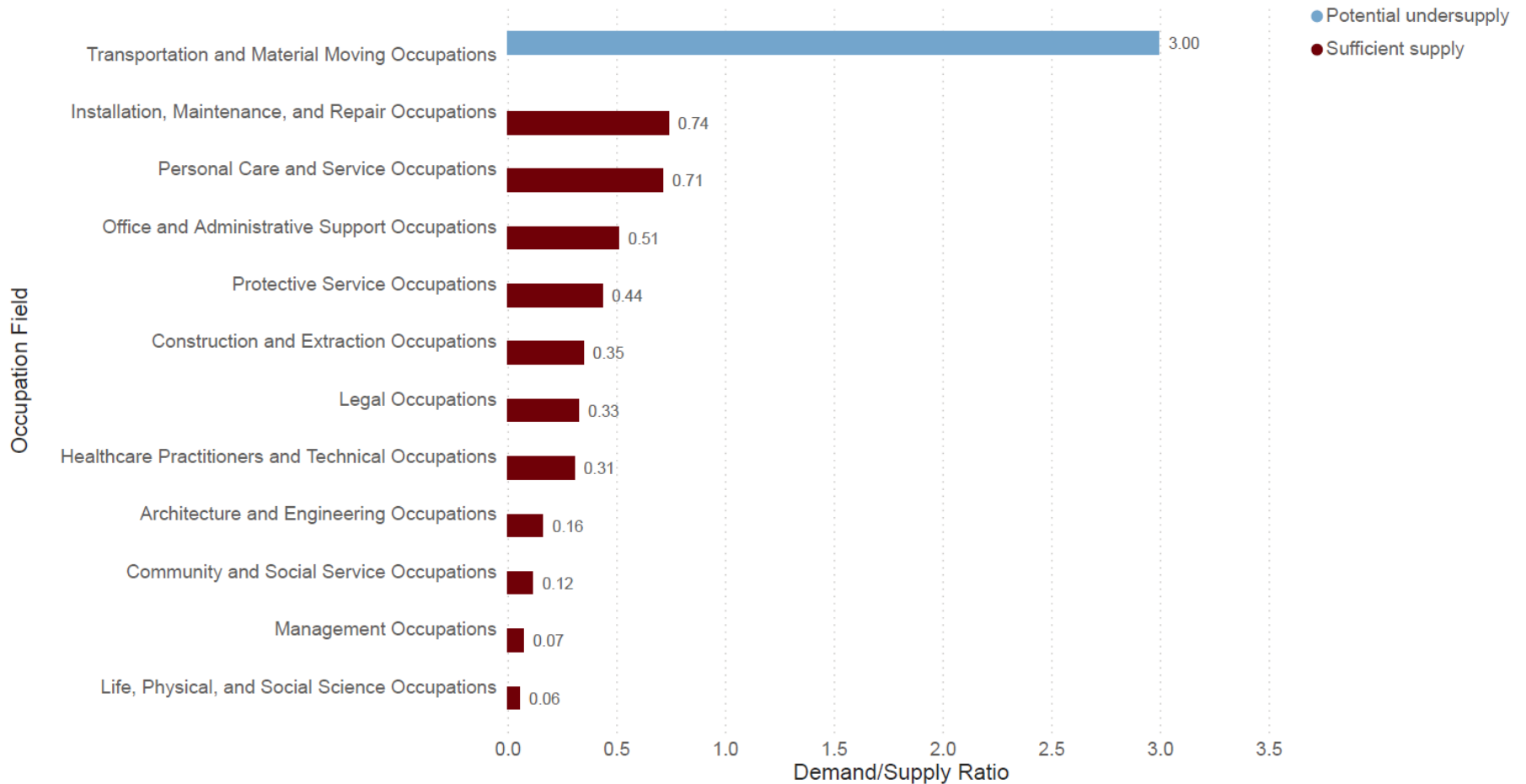


Figure 4 shows the demand and supply ratio for the career field. The ratio is calculated using the formula, job openings divided by the sum of graduates and those unemployed in the field [$\text{Ratio} = \frac{\text{Openings}}{\text{Graduates} + \text{Unemployed}}$]. A ratio of one or greater demonstrates a potential undersupply and less than one shows a sufficient supply. The Transportation and Material Moving Occupation Field is in potential undersupply.

Demand for Hard Skills in Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio

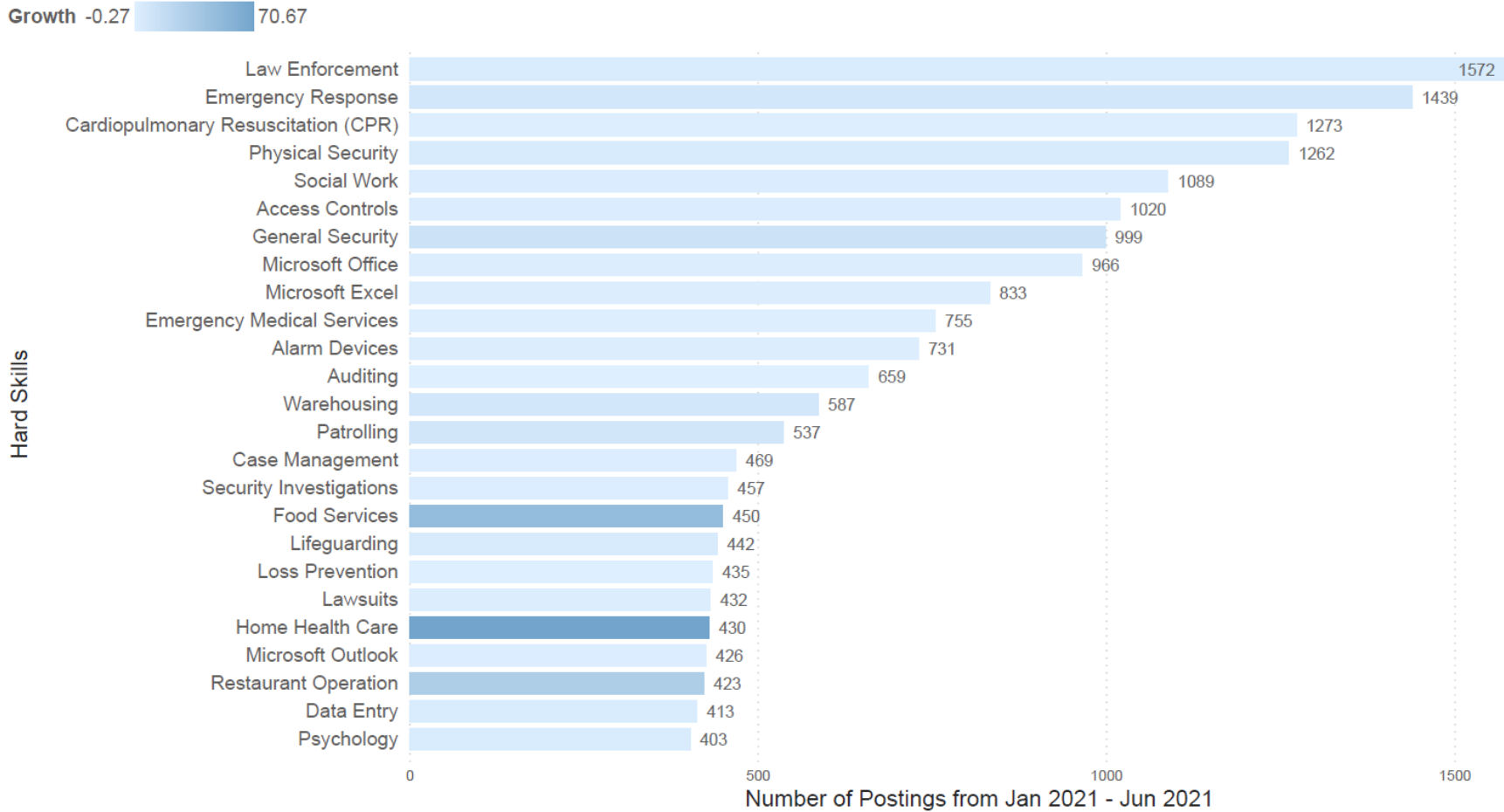


Figure 5 shows the top 25 in-demand hard skills employers are looking for in law and public safety jobs, with the top skill being law enforcement. Additionally, the darker blue demonstrates skills that have seen a greater increase in demand from 2017 to 2021. The greatest increase in demand is in Home Health Care and Food Services at 7067% and 4900%, respectively.

Demand for Soft Skills in Law and Public Safety Jobs in Ohio

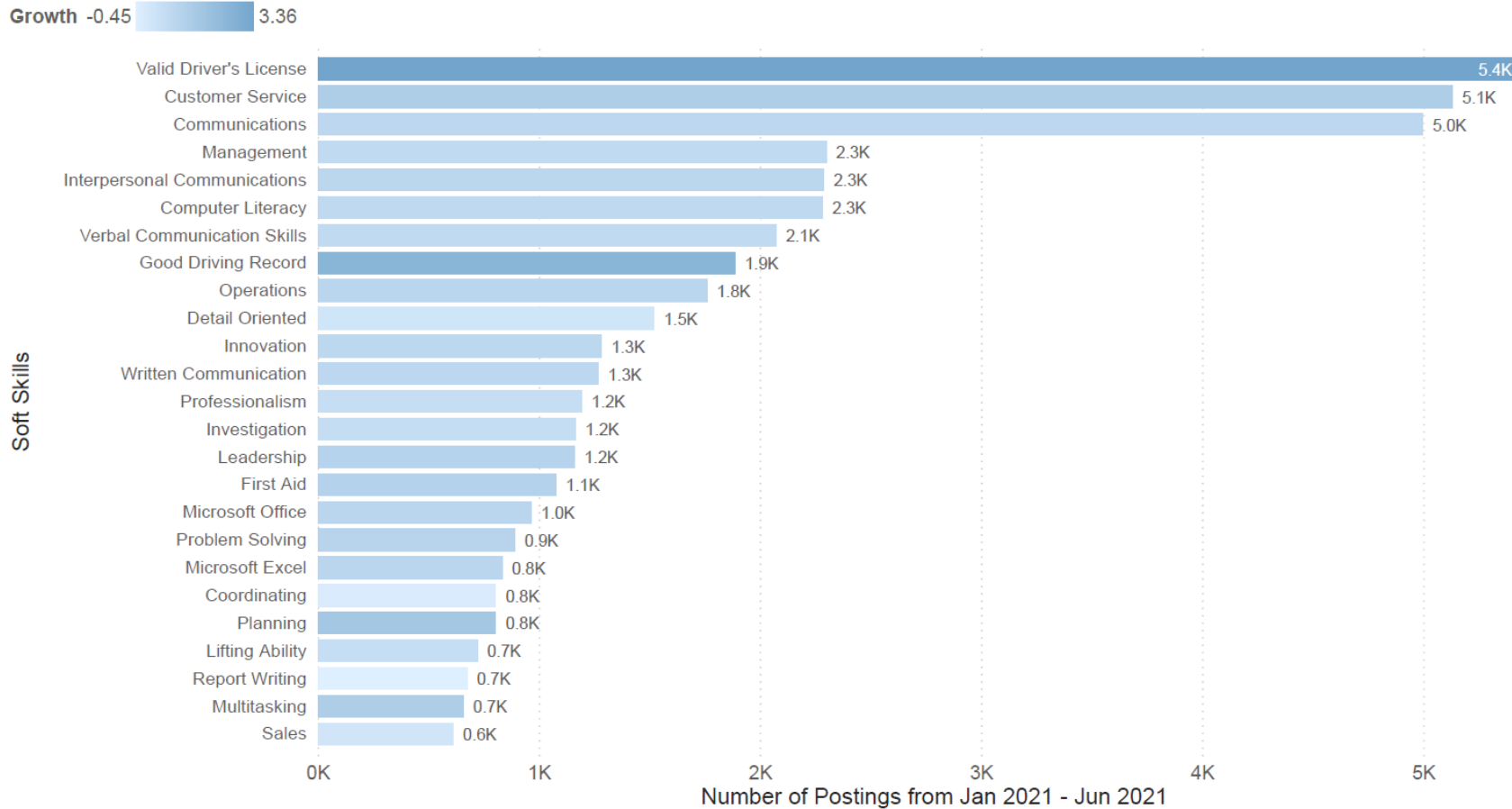


Figure 6 shows the top 25 in-demand soft skills employers are looking for in law and public safety jobs. The top skill is Valid Driver's License, which appeared in 5,445 job postings between January 2021 and June 2021. Additionally, the darker blue demonstrates skills that have seen a greater increase in demand from 2017 to 2021. The greatest increase in demand is in Valid Driver's License and Good Driving Record at 336% and 256%, respectively.
