Career Tech Planning Districts (CTPD)

91 Total Districts

A CTPD is a local education agency configuration that meets the minimum requirements of law and subsequent standards to offer state sanctioned career-technical programming.

Note: Community schools are assigned to Career Technical Planning Districts.

Ohio Revised Code 3313.90 (A1)

Large single district with 1,500 or more students and offers career-technical education in career centers and/or at existing high schools in the district.





CTE programs are offered in youth and adult correctional facilities in Ohio. State prison agencies through the Ohio Central School System and Buckeye United School District collaborate with the Office of Career-Technical Education to receive career-technical support from federal Perkins and state funds.

Six **Ohio Tech Prep Regional Centers** serve as the liaison to Ohio's 91 career-technical planning districts, 23 community colleges and 14 universities to ensure high-quality career-technical education programs for students. The Regional Centers work with their education partners to increase student access to quality career-technical education pathways that provide opportunities to earn college credit while in high school.
