### High School Financial Literacy Licensure Validation Update

The State Board of Education approved the draft of the OAC 3301-24-30 Educator License Validation in Financial Literacy Instruction on April 11. The Department will next file this rule with the Joint Commission for Agency Rule Review for final adoption into the Ohio Administrative Code. The Department is currently developing a financial literacy Ohio Assessment for Educators, as required by the rule, and will begin accepting applications for this new validation as soon as the State Board of Education has adopted the examination.

Ohio Holocaust Commission Launches New Website and Grant Opportunity The Ohio Holocaust and Genocide Memorial and Education Commission recently launched a new website and announced a grant opportunity.

The Commission will make funds available for grants to non-profit, educational and governmental organizations to support educational programming about the Holocaust and genocide that align with definitions in Ohio law. The Commission partnered with Ohio Humanities, the state-based partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities, to operate the grant program.

Grant amounts will be up to \$10,000. The application period opened on April 17, and the deadline to submit applications is May 12. Grant recipients must implement funded projects between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024. Interested applicants are encouraged to review the grant guidelines and review the grant webpage before applying. # Zoomable Digital World History Maps from OER Project

The OER Project has developed zoomable digital World History Maps using Microsoft's Deep Zoom technology. The maps examine specific historical periods at any scale and promote critical historical thinking and reasoning skills. Educators find the maps on the <u>Teacher Resources</u> page.

These maps cover 300 BCE to the Cold War and include three layers:

- 1. A **political map** that identifies the nations and communities students will encounter and explore throughout World History
- 2. A thematic layer that reveals the spread of trade routes, religions, and conflict over time
- 3. A **blank version** of the political map, which educators can zoom in on and crop for use in quizzes and activities

## K-12 Geography Resources from the Leventhal Map & Education Center

The Norman B. Leventhal Map and Education Center at the Boston Public Library offer free geographic resources through <u>its K-12 education page</u>. Resources include <u>lesson plans</u> and <u>professional learning</u> <u>opportunities</u>.
