(2) – If a nonpublic school elects to administer an alternative test, other graduation pathways, such as the end-of-course exams, may not be an option for the school’s students.

(3) – When publishing test results, the school must include overall composite scores, mean scores, 25th percentile scores, and 75th percentile scores for each subject area.
